## Historic Buildings around Clarkson

### The Clarkson Town Hall

3710 Lake Rd

The Town Hall was built in 1899 on the site of the present post office. In 1936 the building, in need of repair, was moved to the present corner and remodeled as part of the WPA ( Work's Progress Administration program, part of the New Deal Program started in 1935 by FDR) resulting in the current Greek Revival Design.
